## Happy New Year

THE New Year is going to be an exciting time for VIC.

Chief Executive Amanda Walton said: "Over the last 12 months we have had an unprecedented rise in demand for our services that has stretched our staff and volunteers to capacity.

"Additionally, we saw the retirement of our Operations Manager and founder Bob Elliott, however it was exciting to welcome him back as a Board Member, Trustee and critical friend.

"We were also delighted to welcome Phil Speddy as our new Operations Manager from May and he has settled superbly into the role.

"VIC is very excited about 2026. We have plans to reshape the charity and we are working with Pilotlight which will help our organisation to build its resilience and capacity and personally, I am really excited about the opportunity."

VIC was one of the charities chosen to receive a package of support from The Weston Charity Awards.

A team from mentoring and



coaching service Pilotlight attended the VIC Centre this month and met with Trustees, staff, volunteers and VIC members.

Chief Executive Amanda Walton and Chair of Trustees Ronnie Barker, pictured above with Clare Gough, Director of the Garfield Western Foundation, that administers the award, will be going to London to have a further meeting with the Pilotlight in February.

Amanda said: "We are moving on to the 'where do we want to go?' stage."

The aim is to jointly construct a mechanism so that, in future, VIC will become less reliant on grant funding and more socially sustainable.

# MP debates Northern Ireland and Troubles Bill with veterans

**HYNDBURN and Haslingden MP Sarah Smith visited the VIC Centre in Haslingden to have a candid conversation with veterans.**

She heard first-hand the thoughts, feelings and concerns of veterans about the ongoing debates around the legacy issues in Northern Ireland and The Troubles Bill.

After the visit, she wrote to the charity to thank everyone for welcoming her to the centre.

She writes: "It was a privilege to listen to your experiences and to hear, with

complete honesty and calm, how the ongoing debates around the legacy issues in Northern Ireland continue to affect you.

"Your service, and the dignity with which you carry the memories of those years, made a deep impression on me.

"Several of you spoke about the feeling that old wounds may be reopened and that veterans, including those who served in specialist units such as the SAS, may be unfairly targeted. I want you to know that I took those concerns away with me and that they will very much be in my mind



throughout the proceedings of the Northern Ireland Troubles Bill."

Chief Executive Amanda Walton said: "She didn't just listen to the veterans, she also reported their concerns back and she did not shy away from the subject at all. Our veterans felt like they had been heard."

## Warm grant

**THANKS to a grant from Lancashire County Council's Warm Spaces Scheme, VIC was able to provide a free warm place for people to meet over the colder winter months.**

**OUR pop-up art shop in Bury closed in January – but it was a huge success selling locally made veterans' art to people from all over the UK and even America.**

The timing of the shop offer, in a prominent place at Mill Gate Shopping Centre, could not have been better as we were able to fit out the premises and open in time for Remembrance and also the Christmas trade.

Chief Executive Amanda Walton said: "It has exceeded any expectations we had when we first approached the Mill Gate as to whether we could have a vacant unit for a short time to exhibit, display and sell artwork and many items produced through laser engraving, sublimation and 3D models.

"Since the first day, the response from the public, veterans, their families, and those who have bought items from us, has been amazing."

She praised Volunteer Arts and Crafts Co-ordinator Darren Horsnell and Outreach Worker Steve Butterworth for their dedication and work and described the shop as a 'phenomenal success'.

With the location near B and M and enroute to the market, it promoted the work of VIC and some of our partners to a wider audience.

One of the volunteers was Wilma McCarrick from The Crown Veterans' Breakfast Club. Before the shop opened, the club had around 20 people for Friday breakfast, in late January they had 36.

As a thank you Wilma was presented

The volunteers who worked on the days the shop opened thoroughly enjoyed it, especially the conversations with people who called in.

Amanda said: "It was really good for new members of our art group to have their work exhibited and when one found out her piece had been sold she burst into tears."

Paintings and prints, along with various other items, were sold to people from Bury and surrounding areas and also the North-East, South-West, Cumbria and even Carolina in the USA.

## VIC-FIT project

**VETERANS will be helping each other to get healthy in a partnership between VIC, Rossendale Borough Council and Rossendale Leisure Trust.**

A grant of £925 has been awarded by the council to VIC and the pilot scheme involves free use of the Leisure Trust facilities.

Operations Manager Phil Speddy said: "VIC-FIT will bridge accessibility issues by offering local veterans structured access to RLT gyms, swimming, and classes, alongside tailored support from VIC staff and volunteers."

A Gym Buddy Scheme means veterans will be accompanied by volunteers to help them feel comfortable in the gym environment.

Group introductions and peer sessions will see confidence-building activities that encourage veterans to exercise together, and form supportive networks, an holistic wellbeing approach will tackle physical and mental health, and support those with conditions such as PTSD, anxiety, obesity, and those with, or at risk of, diabetes and cardiovascular disease.

VIC-FIT will begin with a small pilot group in Rossendale. Proven results could hopefully secure further funding to expand the project.


